





The Grand Canyon: The Earth's Butt Crack

The Grand Canyon Is one of the biggest canyons in the world. Can you believe that!? A "one of the biggest things" in the world right here in the USA. In Arizona to be exact. The Grand Canyon is a National Park. It was made a national park in 1919.

Around 5 million people visit this huge tourist attraction every year!

It's about 270 miles long and at the widest 18 miles long!

It is formed by the Colorado River. Weird huh!? The Colorado River in the Grand Canyon that's Arizona! It's been eroding for around 6 million years.

Once there were natives living in the Grand Canyon. There are ruins in the canyon as evidence there were people along with spear heads and these really cool animal shaped twig figurines. The natives lived there for about 10,000 years. There is this 1,800-year-old ruin tower built by Pueblo Indians called the Grand Canyon Desert Watchtower.

So off the natives stuff and on to the other, more juicy stuff. The canyon has a cool observation platform that has a glass bottom so you can look at the canyon below and be like WOW! The observation platform is called the Grand Canyon Skywalk.

Like I said earlier the Colorado River runs through the Grand Canyon. It's very rapid in some places but less in other places.

The Grand Canyon has a LOT of fossils embedded in the solid rock layers. In some layers the area where the Grand Canyon will form was covered in ocean. These layers will probably have Ammonite Shells and squid impressions.

The Grand Canyon is teeming with wildlife. There are about 350 types of birds that live in or fly over the Grand Canyon and about 1,750 types of plants that thrive on the steep ledges.

The hikes in the Grand Canyon are put into these categories: hard, medium, and easy. The South Rim is a bit easier than the North Rim.

The Grand Canyon has a dam on each end of the canyon. One is the Hoover Dam and the other, less famous one is the Glen Canyon Dam. The water in the Colorado River is about 45 degrees winter or summer!

So yeah I really think the Grand Canyon is really interesting.



Orca whales: Ocean's top Predators

When you think about orca whales, your first thought is probably one of the ocean's top predators, and you're right.

Orcas are the largest member of the dolphin family. They are toothed whales. You can tell when an orca is a male and when it is a female because the males have a taller dorsal fin than females. There are 10 known species of orca whales.

Orca whales have no predators and they eat a lot of creatures, including penguins, seals, polar bears, fish, even other whales! Orcas can be found in all oceans, mostly on the coasts. Orcas live in pods, so you will usually find them with other orcas. Most of the time, a pod has up to 20 orca whales in it. The pod cares for and protects one another.

When it comes to hunting, the orca can teach you a lot of tips. They are very smart. When they search for animals to eat they do something called spyhopping, where they peek their head out of the water and spy their surroundings.

When they find their food, it depends. Orcas will slap their tails against the water to stun their prey. When on Arctic and Antarctic coasts, Orcas will make waves under an animal sleeping on a pack of floating ice, which sometimes makes the animal fall off, too stunned to swim. And sometimes, they will even beach themselves and their prey, making it an easier to catch. Orcas will tear apart big animals, but most often swallow seals whole.

At aquatic parks, orcas have different lives. They perform at shows and help people learn about sea conservation and protection.

Yes, some species of orcas are endangered, due to overfishing and pollution. But we can protect all creatures by reducing the amount of plastic and meat that we use and eat and by reusing plastic, recycling and not buying poached animal parts.

We are in charge of what we do to the world.
